


- Two very different communities. Many shared experiences and issues
- Disruptive flooding but not for several years/some PLP
- Many newer residents and businesses since last significant flooding
- Multiple deprivation
- Low expectations of working with agencies?
- Harder to reach sections of the community
- Relationships around flooding reactive/limited not proactive/long term
- Low awareness of risk and how to be more resilient

Some early feedback.....not quotes but almost!

- "It's United Utilities and the Council's fault they don't maintain things properly"
- "That gully has never been cleaned as far as I can remember"
- "You can never talk to the right person"
- "Nobody listens so its not worth reporting anything"
- "It's never flooded whilst I've been here"
- "All the flooding happens down south now"
- "I'm not the person to speak to but I'll email management"

Why Pathfinder?


- Build bridges proactive not reactive relationships

- Deliver sustainable change












The Starting Point





The Starting Point

- Low awareness of flood risk and what causes/affects it
- Limited preparedness for flood risk
- Limited information about flooding and resilience available within the communities
- Limited engagement with flood management agencies
- Many people and businesses didn't think they had flood risk or that it was a priority for them – communities had changed from the last time there was serious flooding
- No local flood action groups/limited flood awareness activity

Our partnership working



Engagement with communities

- National Flood Forum led and labour intensive
- Working with targeted streets and neighbourhoods
- More than 300 houses and 110 businesses approached/contacted
- Using established networks, community and faith groups, business and landlords forums where possible
- Youth and school activities
- Public events and activities
- Good progress with getting local people more involved and aware e.g. litter, disposal of fats and papers or with practical activities

Raising awareness – Community Hubs

- Up to date information available in the community
- Links to flood alerts and warnings where possible
- Based around how people use their community
- Hubs network categories
- Review and expand as opportunities arise
- Links to agency websites
- Supported by business and householder flood resilience packs
- Rolling it out further






Delivering change - Schools and Scouts


- Schools engagement established through Groundwork and Nature Ed

- Practical activities and learning combined in the neighbourhood
- Sharing experiences with other schools and young people
- Basis of a Youth Flood Forum

Delivering Change – whole house resilience and the Green Deal

- Green Deal for Communities DECC funding to support property insulation
- Targeted at communities experiencing high levels of multiple deprivation
- In Rochdale borough some correlation with high flood risk




Delivering change – whole house resilience and the Green Deal

- Delivered with Energyworks
- Close working with Lead Local Flood Authority and National Flood Forum to ensure joined up engagement in flood risk communities
- Dawning realisation that insulation works could be affected by flooding – requires proper specification to make investment resilient and assist recovery
- Concept of whole house resilience PLP, insulation and property condition all part of a joined up package
- Local Levy support to undertake flood risk assessments linked to GD assessments


- Assessments underway/delivery on site starts soon
- A range of possible measures
- Testing approaches to affordability
- Good buy in to date fuelled by word of mouth
- First blocks on site soon
- Challenges
- Cellars
- Rolling out funding

What we have learned so far

- Each community is different and usually very varied
- People can be angry, unconcerned ,unwilling, enthusiastic and committed
- Business can be very hard to engage with
- Affordability and insurance
- Trust and confidence
- Use the right language
- The 'honest broker' role
- Empowerment and change takes time and comes from within the community
